Dear Friends,

Fr. Jonathan

I do hope and pray as the Lenten Season continues, that it is proving to be fruitful and blessed time. While Lent is a time when we respond to God's generosity in practical ways – our lifestyles, our use of time, money and talents - we are also called to respond in worship, which I hope many of you have discovered through the various and special Lenten devotions that have taken place across the Ministry Area!

As we now look forward, we will have a special opportunity to walk and worship with Jesus, as day by day we follow the events of Holy Week in a few weeks time.

Palm Sunday, 13th April is the start of Holy Week, as many of our services will begin with the blessing of the new Palm Crosses, followed by a Procession, as we re-enact Jesus's joyful entry into Jerusalem, acclaimed by his followers. That first entry was a challenge to the religious and secular authorities, who decided he had to go, and so in this service we also start to turn our thoughts towards Good Friday. So, we include the dramatic reading of the Passion Story on Palm Sunday which forms a sort of overture to Holy Week.

Through the week we follow the journey of Jesus and witness the tension building as Jesus continued to challenge the authorities, and they continued to plot against him. Our Eucharists at 7.00pm on Holy Monday, Holy Tuesday and Holy Wednesday will take us deeper into that journey. Our Maundy Thursday evening Eucharist's (17th) are rooted in the context of the Jewish Passover, the celebration of their liberation from slavery, so central to their history and beliefs, reminding us of the Jewish roots of Jesus' ministry, and the Jewish understanding of God as the one who saves. This Eucharist of the Last Supper recalls Jesus' last Passover meal with his disciples, and his words 'Do this in remembrance of me'.

After this, we can remember Jesus's final struggle with his fate in the Garden of Gethsemane, and his words 'Could you not stay awake with me one hour'. This leads us into Good Friday, 18th, and the final act of the story – Jesus's arrest, his trial, and his death on the cross. Without Good Friday, there would be no Easter! To deepen your

experience of Easter, come and join in one of our acts of response to the Cross!

And then we draw a breath, and wait through Holy Saturday 19th, as the disciples did - though we do also have the opportunity to help clean and decorate our churches!

Easter begins in Margam Abbey and All Saints with the celebration of the Easter Vigil, as we light the Easter fire, from which we light the Paschal Candles, welcoming the Light of Christ and we joyfully proclaim again 'Christ is Risen!'.

Our celebrations continue with our Easter Sunday celebration when we welcome again in all our churches the Light of Christ, we bless the Easter Garden and renew our baptismal vows, recommitting ourselves to the Risen Christ.

So, in order that we immerse ourselves in the true celebration of Easter, may we commit ourselves to journey with Jesus through his passion in Holy Week, so that we can join in that triumphant anthem – 'Surrexit Christus! Alleluia! - Christ is risen! Alleluia!

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I can't believe that it is April already and yet it is rather a funny time in which to write an article for the Ministry Area Magazine. Depending on when you are reading this article, we are either still in the season of Lent, in Holy Week or have just begun the season of Easter.

Many of you know what I chose to do for Lent, as I kept banging on about it which is not good. For those of you who do not know what I decided to do, let me remind you. I decided to give up sweets and chocolate bars and tried to take on walking or cycling daily. Now I must be totally honest with you – during Lent I did fail at both. My cycling lasted a day and my walking lasted a week. I feel that I haven't had a chocolate bar as people have told me that Kit-Kats don't count as they are biscuits so that is one thing I am pleased about. As for the sweets – I was tempted but did well until one day, after a very busy morning and afternoon, I just had to have a sugar rush so I caved in whilst in the Co-op and bought some Haribo sweets to gain more energy to carry on running around like a headless chicken. I do hope your Lent is going/went better than mine did.

In Lent we began our Ministry Area Confirmation classes for people wishing to be Confirmed. The 3 priests of the Ministry Area ran the sessions which were well attended and it was pleasing to see a wide variety of people from all walks of life attending. Some young, others young at heart but nonetheless all moving forward in their journeys of faith. Please continue to keep them in your prayers as we move forward to the Confirmation Service which is going to be held in All Saints Church, Porthcawl on Thursday, 12th June at 7pm.

During Lent we also held a variety of services in our Churches across the Ministry Area which helped us to focus on our faith journeys. Thank you to everyone who attended the extra services and activities held and for all those who volunteered to help in any way. We have also held our congregational meetings across the Churches ready for our Annual Vestry Meeting and I once again thank all those who have stepped forward in volunteering to take on different roles within each Church setting. With limited clergy and extra tasks thrust upon us, we thank God that these Church people put themselves forward to help out. After all, we are the Church - the Body of Christ, rather than the aging buildings.

As I write this article for our magazine, I have just completed my sermon for our service tomorrow (Lent 3). In the Gospel for tomorrow's service, Jesus tells the parable of a man with a fig tree in his vineyard which has not produced any fruit for three years. The man tells his gardener to cut it down: It's just wasting space. But the gardener replies with patient optimism, "Sir, let it alone this year also, until I dig around it and put on manure." Perhaps a few of us feel like we are like the barren fig tree. We take up space, we bask in the sunshine and soak up the rainwater for ourselves, but give nothing back, producing no fruit for others to enjoy. Sometimes the busy-ness of life takes over and we can be quite happy to potter along with no bigger purpose in life, just being, but not giving; failing to see that we must bear fruit if we are to thrive and survive.

However busy we are, or however busy we feel we are, we must not fool ourselves. As Christians, we must ensure that we give time to others, and treat each other with love and respect. We are all sinners, but we must not make that our excuse when we do wrong. We must take time to confess our sins and then find a way to change our lives for the better. What Cardinal Newman meant when he said, "to live is to change, and to be perfect is to have changed often". Followers of Jesus are expected to make changes, to do stuff. He commissions us "that you should go and bear fruit and that your fruit should abide"-Show kindness, give generously, help those in need, be compassionate and forgiving. It's all well and good to believe the right things but we must also *do* the right things. Our Christian faith is not simply a feeling or a good intention. It exists only in the sense that it is demonstrated. We might imagine that we are loving, but unless we love one another, this is just an idea in our head. We may think we are generous, but unless this is manifested in actual giving then it is just a thought about who we think we are.

As the Letter of James says: "Faith apart from works is dead." These good works are the fruits of the Spirit. And so we must let the Holy Spirit guide us as we serve one another by being 'The Church' in the communities where we live, work and worship. The gardener in the parable of the fig tree suggests feeding the tree and waiting for the fruit to appear. Rather than writing it off, God also needs us to feed ourselves and others so that we can serve him faithfully and successfully, after all, we are his workers here on earth. So we need to ensure that we are fed by coming to Church on a regular basis and feeding on the Body and Blood of Jesus so that we can go out into our communities and be the Christians God wants us to be. We can take heart that Jesus is a patient gardener – he has our backs. He doesn't write us off, but is always ready to give us a second chance, ready to help us become the best person we can be.

Imagine if we have another year to produce some fruits for Christ. Can we ask him to dig around us, to fertilise us with the Spirit, to encourage us to acts of kindness for others? What changes can we make in the year ahead to turn our barren fig tree into something beautiful for God, to repay the patient trust he has shown in us? Our little fig tree will one day be no more and its ability to bear fruit will go with it. So let us not waste time; let us put our barren years behind us. Let us not dwell on our weaknesses or failures. Let us seize the opportunity whilst we still have time and see what fruit we can produce in the year ahead.

I wish you all a Blessed and Happy Easter. Fr Wayne

Readings in English and Welsh and stories of some Cook island women were read by members of the different churches in Porthcawl . We would like to thank the Priest and deacons of 'Our Lady of the Sea' for use of their church.

It reminded me of a touring holiday David and I went on 20 years ago all over New Zealand with several days in Rarotonga in the Cook Islands. The island is round and volcanic with a circular road running around the coast. There were minibuses going clockwise and anticlockwise around the island. They would stop anywhere you wanted, no bus stops as such, and people piled on!

We were there on Easter Sunday and went to a church there. All the ladies wore white dresses and straw hats and the men, white shirts. The young children were running in and out bare-footed. They started singing before the organist started so he had to find the key. When we thought the hymn had finished the people came up with more and more verses! They invited us to a buffet lunch afterwards.

On another day there was a typical Maori wedding on the beach .The groom had a splendid cloak of kiwi feathers and the bride was brought to the venue on a canoe pulled through the shallow by four men. The couple were American but he had Maori ancestors. It was a wonderful holiday.

The date of this year's Summer Fayre has been set for Saturday 5th July. As always, we are most grateful for donations towards the various stalls. In addition to cakes, raffle prizes and items for the tombola, handbags and toys would also be gratefully received.

The Other Mary

The Easter story in the gospels is full of wonderful cameos. Among them, one stands out for me for sheer emotional power and deep insight. It's the story of Mary Magdalene.

Jesus had rescued her from a life of depravity - 'seven devils' is the Bible's phrase. For this she repaid Him with the most powerful adoration and love. She stood beside His mother, the 'other' Mary, at the foot of the cross as Jesus was crucified.

On the Sunday morning she went with other women disciples to the tomb to anoint His body. When they arrived they found the tomb was empty. They were told, by someone they took to be an angel, that Jesus of Nazareth wasn't there because He had 'risen'.

The other women left, but a distraught Mary waited outside the tomb, weeping. A man appeared, whom she took to be the gardener.

'Why are you weeping?' He asked. 'What are you looking for?'

'They have taken away my Lord,' she replied, 'and I don't know where they have laid Him'.

The man then spoke one word, which changed her life for ever.

'Mary', He said, using the familiar form of her name.

'Teacher!' she cried, and made to embrace Him.

'Don't touch me,' He said. 'I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go and tell the others'.

She did, and became the first person after the resurrection to say, 'I have seen the Lord'.

She would see Him again, of course, in the upper room with the other disciples, but then never again on earth, until she saw Him in His ascended glory, not as the carpenter's son but as the Son of God.

It really is some story.

The history of Penarth is intriguing, and many books expound this. Penarth deserves to be praised! Surely a place to visit soon .




