Dear Friends, Fr. Jonathan

As we arrive in November we are once again caught up in the season of 'Remembrance.' Beginning with All Saints Day, followed quickly by All Souls Day, then Remembrance Sunday and Armistice!

Reminisce, Remember, Recall, Recollect, Remind, all have the prefix 're'. When we use 're', we mean again, or even again and again. In short, repetition – another 're' word.

The second Sunday in November is Remembrance Sunday when we will witness whole communities gathering to recall, remember, reminisce, recollect and are reminded of conflicts and war, where men, women, children and animals lost their lives or had them significantly changed.

If we look carefully, we will find we have symbols of the service and sacrifice of others all around us – poppies, war memorials, old letters, medals and Remembrance season are all ways to recall what our family, friends and those unknown to us have been through. It is right to remember those who have gone before us; we do that all the time. It is good to pause, to gather our thoughts, to gather as a community, to recall, reflect and be reminded of events that drastically changed lives and communities. We may not have a personal memory to connect us to war or conflict, but we can still feel emotionally involved in the story of those who were there as we remember again.

In the book of Joshua (4:4-7), Joshua asks representatives of the tribes of Israel to place stones as a lasting memorial. This passage speaks powerfully of what Remembrance is about... to tell a story.

The war memorials we stand in front of at this time of year are not just stone or wooden memorials with a list of names, but they are places which tell stories. Such stories which speak of sacrifices made and of freedoms won and lost. This is why we should always look to discover the stories behind those names – to read and to research. That is also why it is so important that with the passing of the generations those stories are passed on; so that the peace which we enjoy today is not only commemorated, but celebrated.


Sadly, war continues to rage in other parts of our world today, so as

we look at the dark and broken world around us, may we place our hope in God, using the prayer of the Late Archbishop Desmond Tutu:

"Good is stronger than evil; love is stronger than hate; light is stronger than darkness; life is stronger than death. Victory is ours, through him who loves us."

And empower us to face the challenges, in the midst of the many tribulations in our world that can cause hatred and division, to make our lives ones that promote goodness and love, life and light. Amen. With love and prayers,

All Saints Day, celebrated on November 1st, is a special time in the Christian calendar dedicated to honouring and remembering all the saints - both known and unknown - who have lived exemplary lives of faith, courage, and devotion to God. This day offers a moment to reflect on their lives, draw inspiration from their journeys, and consider the call to sainthood in our own lives. Through scripture, we can gain deeper insights into the significance of All Saints Day and the profound legacy of those who have gone before us.

The Great Cloud of Witnesses: Hebrews 12:1-2 offers a powerful image of the saints as a "great cloud of witnesses" surrounding us. This passage reminds us that the saints are not distant figures but are present with us, cheering us on in our journey of faith. Their lives serve as testimonies to God's grace and power, encouraging us to remain steadfast in our pursuit of holiness.

The Bible is replete with stories of men and women who exemplified deep faith and unwavering commitment to God. Hebrews 11, often referred to as the "Hall of Faith," recounts the stories of many such individuals. From Abel to Noah, Abraham to Moses, and Rahab to David, these saints demonstrated extraordinary faith in the face of challenges and uncertainties.

Consider the story of Abraham, who "by faith...obeyed and went, even though he did not know where he was going" (Hebrews 11:8). His willingness to trust God, even when the path was unclear, is a powerful lesson for us today. Similarly, the faith of Moses, who "chose to be mistreated along with the people of God rather than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin" (Hebrews 11:25), reminds us of the importance of standing firm in our faith, even when it requires sacrifice.

In Matthew 5:1-12, Jesus delivers the Beatitudes, a series of blessings that highlight the characteristics of those who are considered blessed in the Kingdom of God. These traits—humility, mercy, purity of heart, and a hunger for righteousness—are reflective of the lives of the saints.

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 5:3) speaks to the humility and dependence on God that characterized the saints. "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled" (Matthew 5:6) points to their unwavering commitment to justice and holiness. As we celebrate All Saints Day, the Beatitudes serve as a reminder of the qualities we should strive for in our own lives.

1 Peter 1:15-16 calls us to a life of holiness: "But just as he who called you is holy, so be holy in all you do; for it is written: 'Be holy, because I am holy.'" The saints are examples of this call to holiness. Their lives were marked by a profound dedication to God and a desire to reflect His holiness in all they did.

Holiness is not about perfection but about a continual striving to live according to God's will. It involves daily acts of love, compassion, and service. The saints, through their lives of prayer, selflessness, and dedication, exemplify what it means to live a holy life. On All Saints Day, we are reminded of this call to holiness and encouraged to pursue it with renewed vigour.

One of the comforting aspects of All Saints Day is the belief in the intercession of the saints. Revelation 8:3-4 gives us a glimpse of the heavenly realm, where the prayers of the saints are offered before God: "Another angel, who had a golden censer, came and stood at the altar. He was given much incense to offer, with the prayers of all God's people, on the golden altar in front of the throne. The smoke of the incense, together with the prayers of God's people, went up before God from the angel's hand."

The saints, who have gone before us, continue to intercede on our behalf. Their prayers join with ours, creating a powerful chorus before the throne of God. This belief offers solace and encouragement, knowing that we are supported by a heavenly community that cares for us and lifts us up in prayer.

All Saints Day is not only about remembering those who have gone before us but also about recognizing our call to live as saints in the present day. Ephesians 4:1-3 urges us to "live a life worthy of the calling you have received. Be completely humble and gentle; be

patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace."

We are called to embody the same virtues and dedication as the saints. This means living lives of integrity, compassion, and service. It means standing up for justice, caring for the marginalized, and spreading the love of Christ wherever we go. As we celebrate All Saints Day, let us recommit ourselves to this high calling and strive to be living examples of God's grace and love.

All Saints Day is a time to reflect on the lives of those who have gone before us, to draw inspiration from their faith and dedication, and to renew our own commitment to living as saints. Through scripture, we gain a deeper understanding of the significance of this day and the legacy of the saints.

As we remember the great cloud of witnesses, let us be encouraged to run our race with perseverance, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith. Let us strive for holiness, embody the virtues of the Beatitudes, and live lives of compassion and service. And let us find comfort in the intercession of the saints, knowing that we are supported by a heavenly community that prays for us and lifts us up before God.

May All Saints Day be a time of reflection, inspiration, and renewed dedication to living out our faith with the same fervour and devotion as the saints who have gone before us. Amen.

We're all called to share the Good News

This week in our study group we are looking at St Paul's letter to the Romans, chapters 9 to 11. Chapter 10 particularly highlights our responsibility as individuals to spread the Good News, through outward facing mission. In chapter 10, St Paul writes ¹³ for, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." ¹⁴ How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard?" and later, in verse 15, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

I enjoyed and was very much encouraged by Rev. Wayne's sermon in All Saints last Sunday (Trinity 21), which focussed largely on the same topic. He mentioned that the Ministry Area will shortly be advertising for a new member of the clergy team, in the role of Priest Missioner. Whilst I'm sure that that doesn't imply that the rest of the clergy team can put their *beautiful* feet up, it does emphasise that spreading the good news of salvation through Christ and building up our church is our primary duty. The need to be active in outward facing mission as individuals was the key theme of Rev. Wayne's message. He highlighted that, when Jesus brought together the disciples, none of them were religious leaders or trained theologians – they were ordinary people, like you and me. But Jesus chose them to be the core group that would build his church after his death on the cross, despite their humble backgrounds and many personal flaws.

I have no idea when the appointment process will formally begin or how long it will last. However, I have long been an advocate of the contribution that lay people can and must make to the growth of a healthy church family. As such, I look forward to working alongside someone whose mission is Mission.

Last night I watched The Pride of Britain Awards. The heroes of the night had been brave, selfless, courageous and inspirational. The first young lady to achieve this award was Florrie Bank. As a six-year-old she was diagnosed with acute leukaemia. She was treated, and overcame the cancer, but the treatment left her needing a lung transplant. She is currently on the list and will shortly be expecting her new lung. This young lady, using TikTok as her channel, is helping other cancer sufferers to be less frightened with her cheerful, happy disposition and is making a difference to children who need that help to overcome the fear of cancer. This little girl truly deserved this award and is brave, selfless and an inspiration.

Another young man, 10-year-old Jacob Newson, has raised £150,000 in memory of his mum who died when he was seven. He completed many challenges through his own determination and has been able to donate this money to the hospice where his mum died. He will carry on running, walking, or doing whatever it takes to keep raising money. An admirable young man.

Now a young Gurkha soldier fighting in Afghanistan lost both his legs above the knee when he was blown up on manoeuvres. This soldier with his artificial legs has as a double amputee been the first person to climb Everest. His name is Hari Budha Hagar. He is now 45 and says he wants to change the perception of disability and encourages people to climb their own mountain. This young Gurkha has determination, courage and truly will inspire others.

Several other brave people received awards, including Hewitt Clark, the most highly decorated living lifeboatman, a man who with no thought of the danger has saved hundreds of lives. His courage and selflessness deserve the many awards he has achieved.

These few that I have written about are outstanding, amazing people - true heroes. You may have a hero in your life, someone who does that extra kind gesture, maybe a neighbour who will take in a Sunday dinner for an invalid old lady, or will spend half an hour chatting on the phone to cheer her and make her day. When I got up, I went to the kitchen Glass of water, no! not now for me The shock and the way I was feeling Meant I must have a G n T

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

The Posada

Las Posadas is a traditional Christmas celebration that originated in Mexico. The word *posada* means 'inn' or 'shelter' in Spanish and is a celebration of the Christmas story. Taking place during December,



the posada commemorates the journey that Joseph and Mary made from Nazareth to Bethlehem in search of a safe refuge where Mary could give birth to the baby Jesus.

The Posada in Porthcawl starts at All Saints on December 1 (Advent Sunday) where it is blessed and given to the 1st host. It comprises Mary, Joseph and the donkey being welcomed into houses across the Porthcawl area. They stay a night before moving on.

Thank you to everyone who has donated in the regular YELLOW BUCKET collection point at the back of the churches instigated last Christmas providing for - the homeless, 'leaving care' Church Army projects 'Ty Bronna' hostel and the 'Amber Project'; and supporting vulnerable young people, with and without children, suffering issues like family breakdown, mental health, substance misuse and self-harm alongside money worries and day-to-day cost of living crises.

For those who don't know, these Church Army projects are very close to Fr Jonathan (Durley)'s heart as before entering the priesthood, he was a qualified social worker and the manager of Ty Bronna. [If you ask me, it's just an excuse to go back there delivering goods, to check his old office and time capsule! Ha, ha! Yes, he really did create a time capsule with the 14 - 25yr olds he supported! How cool is that (Blue Peter 'eat your heart out')]

However, I digress. Ty Bronna is a warm and welcoming home for young people. What Fr Jon has asked me to share is that on Thursday 26th September, we visited Ty Bronna with 11 large carrier bags of items donated by kind NNP congregations from the yellow buckets toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo, soap, flannels, shower gel, sanitary products, cosmetics, hairbrushes, combs, aftershave, deodorant (think teenager!), socks and underwear. Ty Bronna staff were thrilled. One young mum resident at Ty Bronna was thrilled with leggings for her toddler daughter. Our next visit there will be for Christmas 2024 (think chocolate, make-up and socks!). Ty Bronna staff also expressed a need for home cleaning products and washing powder, providing for young people learning independent living skills all year.

Please note: Some items such as toothbrushes, washing powder and nappies overlap with what the young people supported by the Church Army need and what's given to Foodbank, both ongoing NNP charitable mission projects. But PLEASE don't confuse the yellow buckets with the purple ones which are specifically for the Foodbank (contact via Judith Shawe).

A Last Minute Sightseeing Trip

At the end of every month I send an email to a dozen people, family and friends, detailing how my month has been used. On rare occasions there is some feedback, and on the 5th came the news that my nephew was going to travel, in a few days time, from his Norfolk home to help his sister, who would travel from her home on the Isle of Man to look after their mother, my sister. She developed dementia ten years ago and has been wonderfully accommodated and lovingly cared for by her other son and his wife, who would be able to have a week of holiday. What an achievement; both gave up teaching, bought a small hotel by the sea, and made new careers which would enable their mother to have endless care. What sacrifice!

Now I have not seen these folk for some years so I began to plan how I could have an hour with them. My National Senior railcard had expired so £30 was spent at the station, and, "on line", a Travelodge room in Paignton was booked for the 9th and 10th. By the 7th an itinerary was typed out and though travel alone is simpler, it is also selfish, so I asked my son with FragileX, who has not been on holiday for thirty years, if he wished to come.

If you read about FragileX you will soon find that women transmit it, and my word I know how men suffer from it.

So this is how we came to leave Cardiff and see the front of Exeter Cathedral, go into the Guildhall, and cross the cast iron bridge of 1834. We walked from Dawlish Warren to Dawlish alongside the railway which was swept away and left hanging above the sea in February 2014, see the black swans, and the platform at Torquay where my parents came on honeymoon in 1936, then walk along the promenade at Paignton.

Early morning along the prom is delightful and we found the family gathering so very rewarding. My son in particular was overjoyed to see his cousins, one of whom he had not seen for thirty years. They had so much to talk about. My sister managed the word brother when she saw me before dozing off. All too soon we were shown the latest feature of the hotel, a hot tub, and were walking away to have our

sandwiches in the formal gardens of magnificent Oldway Mansion, where the Singer sewing machine was invented and developed. Onward to the monuments to the thousand plus Home Guard volunteers who died in the war, and to Agatha Christie who lived nearby. My son spoke up at the tourist office and they tracked down a plaque near where the idea for Fawlty Towers was conceived. So we waited for a bus to take us there and spoke to local people who knew more. Another bus brought the exhausting day to a pleasant end.

The journey home started by seeing the steam engine ready to haul the trains to the River Dart. Back past the black swans and the walk along the new concrete and past Starcross pumping house for Brunel's Atmospheric Railway. A break in Weston super Mare to visit the beautiful memorial garden to Jill Dando, and in Bristol to find the Balmoral near to the Great Britain and the Samuel Plimsoll memorial. A very crowded Friday afternoon train brought us back to the starting point in Cardiff. Wow!

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


