Dear Friends.

Firstly, Happy New Year to you all. I do hope 2025 will be a year of great blessing.

I am writing this during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, which this year focuses on the question posed by Jesus to Martha: 'Do you believe this?' (John 11:26) from the Gospel of Story of the raising of Lazarus.

This year is the 1700th anniversary of the first Ecumenical Council, meeting in Nicaea in 325, which gathered Christian communities from around the world to strengthen their relationships as the Church of Jesus Christ. The council also established the Nicene Creed as a central statement of faith, which still remains integral today for us as Christians. The council of Nicaea was a momentous point in our Christian heritage, despite the many ways in which the church has diverged over the centuries. While some churches have retained a vision closer to that envisaged at Nicaea in 325, there are other parts of the Christian family who have adopted non-credal models, instead focusing on other forms of expression of shared Christian faith.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is a time to celebrate our faith, to deepen our understanding and relationships with our fellow Christians, which strengthens our unity in diversity. It is an opportunity to celebrate, to draw strength and encouragement from the gift of our shared faith, especially in these troubled and turbulent times. The Church which met in Nicaea was one that had been shaken and wounded by violence and persecution, which may parts of the church across our world continues to experience today.

As we celebrate this significant anniversary, we are challenged to reflect on what may be getting in the way of our shared and collective witness as Christians, as we seek to be the Body of Christ in the world today.

Lent: Why 40 days?

Lent is meant to be a time of repentance. It is the 40 days from Ash Wednesday to Easter that are set aside to praise and worship the Lord; to read the Bible more, and to pray more often. Christians who observe Lent correctly anticipate deeper intimacy with the Lord.

The 40 days of Lent this year (weekdays excluding Sundays) begin on Wednesday, March 5th and end on Holy Saturday, April 19th. But why is it 40 days?

40 is a significant number in Jewish-Christian scripture:

- In Genesis, the flood which destroyed the earth was brought about by 40 days and nights of rain.
- The Hebrews spent 40 years in the wilderness before reaching the land promised to them by God.
- Moses fasted for 40 days before receiving the ten commandments on Mount Sinai.
- Jesus spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness in preparation for his ministry.

Many will have written new year's resolutions which may already be broken. I know gyms rub their hands together at the start of a new year as so many people join them and the month of January is their busiest time of the year. However, by February, many fall by the wayside and pay their memberships but don't bother attending. Some could even be stuck in 12 month contracts which are a drain to finances when the facilities are not used. But attending Church is not like that at all. We don't have to pay to attend our services. I wonder how many of us have made a new year's resolution to attend Church services more regularly or perhaps take on another service in perhaps another Church in our Ministry Area? Wouldn't it be lovely if our Churches were gaining numbers like gyms rather than dropping in congregations?

Unfortunately, we have lost a few faithful people from our Churches this year and we continue to pray for those we have lost and those who are left behind. For relatives, sometimes going back to Church

after a bereavement can be a difficult thing. But we must remember that they are still part of our Church family, so it is our responsibility to encourage them back and support their needs. Please be mindful of this when you see them next and tell them that we miss them and want them to come back into the fold.

I was chatting to a few people this week from various Churches across our Ministry Area and they were saying how they have noticed a drop in attendance figures. Just imagine if we all brought one person, perhaps a friend of neighbour or someone looking for a Church to our services, then our numbers would double. There are so many people in the areas where we live that need that little encouragement to step foot across the threshold of our Churches - people we should be looking out for and nurturing. And when they come, we need to be a lot more welcoming. The amount of times I have heard people turn to me and say that someone had been rude to them on their first visit that they would never enter 'that place' again is guite worrying. Terms like 'You can't sit there as that is my seat' or 'Your children were noisy today' certainly don't make people feel welcome. And some people need guidance through a service if the language and structure is alien to them. Let them sit by us and we can show them through it.

As Christians, it is our responsibility to let others know that God loves them and wants a relationship with them. We are all responsible for building the Kingdom of God here on earth – not just the Priest. So I challenge you this new year to think about how you can tell the joyful story and build on your capacity for doing good as we continue to work together in love in our Ministry Area. We are the Body of Christ here on earth. Let's do away with nasty words, thoughts, actions and emails. Let's be more Christlike in our approach to one another. And let us remember that when we support, encourage and love one another, when we are serving one another, it is actually Christ we are serving. Let me leave you with this Bible quote –

Then the king will say to those at his right hand, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you

gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

Wise words from Jesus our King and Shepherd of the sheep.

World Day of Prayer 2025 "I made you wonderful"

Our sisters in The Cook Islands welcome us and lead us for the Day of Prayer 2025. This group of 15 islands in the South Pacific Ocean has a rich and colourful Māori heritage and a deep connection to nature. Join us as we pray together and reflect on the theme 'I made you wonderful'.

World Day of Prayer is an international, ecumenical organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is vast, the service begins with the writing country and theme being chosen a number of years earlier. Once written it goes to the International Committee in New York for translation and dissemination to the National Committee in each participating country. The service is then discussed and edited before being presented nationally, regionally and then locally for branches to make their plans. Finally, at a church near you, on Friday 7 March 2025, people will gather to celebrate the service prepared by the women of The Cook Islands.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 120 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world—through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later. A worldwide wave of prayer....

In Porthcawl, our service will be held in Our Lady Star of the Sea Catholic Church at 2pm on Friday 7 March 2025. All are welcome.



Welsh Girl Wins £100

The following newspaper cuttings and information were posted on Facebook recently by Tony John, grandson of Molly John. Molly will be remembered by many Porthcawl parishioners as a familiar face in church and was particularly well known for the beautiful embroidery she did for church vestments. I remember as a young girl visiting her in Victoria Avenue to see the vestments she was embroidering for Fr Philip Ursell. Her work was exquisite, and it was the first time I had ever seen someone using such fine gold embroidery thread and gold kid leather.

But it seems, embroidery was not the only talent Molly possessed. Here is Tony's Facebook article:

Things you find out about your grandparents.

Well my grandmother, Molly John, was a dark horse. In 1927, aged 13, she won an essay competition and the prize money was £100!

My daughter went on a mission to find out more about her and discovered that she was always in the papers for her love of sewing and embroidery, as well as flowers when she was a judge on a few shows. It's crazy that she kept this all quiet.



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News from St John's





Christmas Sparkle and The Family Breakfast

Christmas Sparkle has just completed its third round. This charitable objective aims to provide new, or as good as new, toys to families who could not otherwise afford them. Initiated by Mrs. Vanessa Evans from St. James, the scheme was adopted by the Mission Group and has since grown from strength to strength. We now accept donations from other churches within the Ministry Area in addition to those from other groups and individuals. As a result, last Christmas over 500 children received some very welcome gifts.

We are truly grateful to everyone who donated or helped with deliveries to make this possible.

We now average about 80 people per week attending Family Breakfast. We are all delighted by the way The Family Breakfast has grown whilst regretting the circumstances which make it a necessity in our area. We still operate on a "Take if you need, donate if you can" basis. Financially in theory, it shouldn't work, but, thanks to the very generous support from businesses and individuals, it does. This Christmas, in addition to the weekly support offered every Saturday, we were also able to supply "Bonus Bags" and Asda vouchers to the families most in need to tide them over this demanding period.

The children who attend Family Breakfast were delighted to welcome Father Christmas and his elf on the 14th December. As Father Christmas is rather short of stature and his elf is particularly tall, they made an interesting and very entertaining duo! As well as the selection boxes donated by the Community Council, a very kind lady also provided gift bags of toys and sweets for every child. Having grown up in a large family when times were hard, she now wanted to make sure that these children had a particularly good Christmas. The kindness of individuals in our community never ceases to amaze me.

The following Saturday we were delighted to welcome Father Jonathan Durley for a Christingle service. With their parents, the children made their own Christingle, as Father Jonathan explained the meaning of each component. Carols were sung and prayers were said and this

year it was so good to see adults without children staying to participate in the service and share in the joy of Christmas.

As we approach our second birthday, we were delighted to welcome Stephen Kinnock MP to join us. He noted that the Family Breakfast was unique in that it combined a sociable community venue with food and pantry provision without any sense of discrimination. He suggested that it was a model that could be adopted elsewhere.

Familiar Phrases from the Good Book

Do puzzles sometimes drive you to your wits' end? Or are they always a labour of love? Do some answers come to you in the twinkling of an eye, while others keep you pondering until the eleventh hour? If someone tries to help does it feel like the blind leading the blind? Or does other people's advice fall on stony ground? Did you know that all of these familiar sayings come from the King James' Bible!

At one's wits' end is from the Old Testament, Psalm 107:'They reel to and fro, and stagger like a drunken man, and are at their wits' end.' The other examples are from the New Testament.

In St Matthew's Gospel, Jesus says of the Pharisees: 'Let them alone: they be blind leaders of the blind. And if the blind lead the blind, both shall fall into the ditch.'

The phrase 'eleventh hour' is from a parable, also in Matthew, where vineyard workers who turn up at the eleventh hour still get paid for a full day's work. The parable of the farmer who sows seeds 'on stony ground' where they do not thrive is from Mark's Gospel.

'In the twinkling of an eye' appears in Corinthians: 'In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump; for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed.'

'Labour of love' appears in both the Old Testament (Hebrews) and the New (Thessalonians).

So, don't give up the ghost (from Genesis) just yet. There's no peace for the wicked (Isaiah) in the world of puzzles. If you believe you can finish them then faith will move mountains (Matthew). Press on, fight the good fight (Timothy) and then you can eat, drink and be merry (Ecclesiastes).

A Tribute to Margaret Griffiths

This is an excerpt from the Address provided at the funeral service of Margaret Griffiths, St Theodore's Church, Kenfig Hill on Monday 16th December 2024.

'It's been said that where love is given, life is given, and Margaret gave her life and love to so many over the course of the decades of her life. To her much-loved family, friends, neighbours, colleagues and the many with whom she connected through the many avenues of service. With each person she loved, she practiced the giving away of herself.

If ever I've known a person who could be described as being full of good works, it was Margaret, no matter whether it was with her much -loved family; her church family here in St Theodore's; the wider Margam Ministry Area; in the wider community of Bridgend and the province of Wales, of which she held such great pride. Margaret responded to the call to serve, so humbly, never tooting her own



horn, hesitating or complaining. That is unless you mentioned key terms such as the Daily Mail, Brexit, Library closures or immigration, where she would readily let you know her views firmly based on social justice. As on all these subjects Margaret would take no prisoners. As she was a true champion for inclusivity, challenging fake news, promoting open borders and providing grass roots access to information, literature and knowledge! She just knew and did what was needed to be done or to act, both humbly and tirelessly.

Even in supposed retirement, she readily took up or continued the roles as funding development officer for St Theodore's re-ordering; Parish Warden & PCC Secretary; Sub-Warden; Ministry Area Council Member; Magazine correspondent from St Theodore's. Then there was her love of music with the many Choirs in which she sang; being a Breakfast Project volunteer; Distributor of Christmas Presents for the Sparkle Campaign; School Governor; Awen Trustee; Dementia Friend; and a community befriender......Even putting out the weekly refuse for her church, her service knew no bounds and it was not beyond what she felt was her sense of duty and her call as a Christian. As in all her actions there was always a sense of social responsibility, because she cared about her community. And this address just scratches the surface as we celebrate her life and faith.

Margaret's Christian faith and belief in the resurrection was fundamental to her life and witness. Margaret lived her life because of her immense love for her family, her love for others and her belief in the resurrection of Christ. Her faith was the core of her inner being which sustained her, motivated her and gave her optimism in life. She returns to God with a multiple increase of the talents given to her in life. For certain, she will hear the words of the Lord saying to her "Well done, good and faithful servant!

Margaret was the stature of being strong, loving and wise. It was only in having more strength, more love, more wisdom and indeed, more faith that Margaret was able to be larger than any other obstacle or challenge in her life.

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Cogitations of an Old Codger

Editor's Note: It was a delight in December to be invited to the launch of John Berry's book "Cogitations of an Old Codger". As John says this book is "the musings of a (sometimes) maverick. A brief, autobiographical glimpse into a very full life: no skeletons — no scandals — no fights!" Congratulations, John, on this publication. Here is short excerpt to give you a flavour of its contents.

Together

"Next Sunday we will exchange pulpits with the Methodists."

To a nine-year old choirboy a pulpit was a rather large wooden structure that the vicar mounted every Sunday to talk to the congregation – as he had his back to us we choirboys didn't take much notice of him at that point! Now my mind was in a whirl – will the Methodist pulpit be as nice as ours and how will they move such a big item! Exchange of pulpits meant that the preacher would be from another Church, our vicar would go to their service. It was the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 1945.

Ten years later I was in uniform in Germany, as the organist in the Anglican church the padre talked with me about the Week of Prayer. He knew I played occasionally for the Roman Catholic (RC) and the Free Church services. He had Ministerial contacts with the Lutheran Church in the local town.

The Anglican Church (Church of England or CofE in the armed forces) was the main church building. When fully opened it could seat five hundred, though our weekly congregation was about fifty. The RC and Free Churches plus the local RC and Lutheran congregations were invited to join our Sunday morning worship in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

Although he had been keen for this service to take place, the Padre became increasingly nervous, would anyone turn up, would they know the hymns (choice of hymns was left to the organist - we knew who would be responsible if there was a disaster in that area!). The Lutheran Minister had been asked to preach. Then the RC priest made

it known he would be present, so he was invited to lead the prayers. On Sunday morning the church was set up optimistically with some three hundred chairs – more and more had to be brought in until the church was packed to standing room! Then, consternation, it was realised that the Burgermeister (Mayor) was in the congregation; he had to be brought forward and a seat found for him beside the Station Commander!

The first hymn was The Church's One Foundation to the tune Cruger. It was one of those back-of-the-neck hair-raising moments as the entire congregation joined in the singing. All the hymns were set to music by German composers finishing with Thine Be the Glory to Handel's Judas Maccabeus.

That was my first real interdenominational service. Over the years since then i have experienced many different forms of recognising the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.



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
